From UC Berkeley to the Sorbonne to Harvard to Yugoslavia--where he traveled to prove his idea definitively by studying its traditional singers of heroic poetry--we follow Parry on his idiosyncratic journey, observing just how his early notions blossomed into a full-fledged theory. Kanigel gives us an intimate portrait of Parry's marriage to Marian Thanouser and their struggles as young parents in Paris, and explores the mystery surrounding Parry's tragic death at the Palms Hotel in Los Angeles. Tracing Parry's legacy to the modern day, Kanigel explores how what began as a way to understand the Homeric epics became the new field of "oral theory," which today illuminates everything from Beowulf to jazz improvisation, from the Old Testament to hip-hop.

Now, since accentuation of syllables is the only possible equivalent in English for what is called quantity in Greek or Latin, it follows that any unnatural wresting or straining of the accentuation must necessarily destroy the music and rhythm of the metre, just as false quantities would do in Greek or Latin verse, and thus render its sound displeasing, rugged and harsh.
